## MUSCULAR ANATOMY OF CATS AND DOGS

- SMOOTH MUSCLES: FOUND IN THE WALLS OF INTERNAL ORGANS, THESE MUSCLES CONTROL INVOLUNTARY MOVEMENTS, SUCH AS DIGESTION AND BLOOD CIRCULATION.
- CARDIAC MUSCLES: THIS SPECIALIZED MUSCLE TYPE MAKES UP THE HEART, PROVIDING THE NECESSARY CONTRACTIONS TO PUMP BLOOD THROUGHOUT THE BODY.

ADDITIONALLY, THE MUSCLE FIBER COMPOSITION VARIES; CATS HAVE A HIGHER PROPORTION OF FAST-TWITCH FIBERS, ENABLING QUICK BURSTS OF SPEED, WHILE DOGS POSSESS MORE SLOW-TWITCH FIBERS, ALLOWING FOR STAMINA OVER LONGER DISTANCES.

## ORGAN SYSTEMS IN CATS AND DOGS
