Prospects for change are historically good but change is likely to take time. Nor can the direction of change be easily predicted despite the country's choices increasingly narrowing between that of a naked military regime on the one hand and a pluralistic republic on the other. However, given the country's vibrant and defiant civil movement and their progressive social democratic program for change, Iran again could become a trendsetter for the rest of the region, were these forces to return to the corridors of power.
