Apparently, the male character represents the dominant part in the relationship and the successful one in the conversation. As the girl states But I don't care about me. And I'll do it and then everything will be fine (HEMINGWAY, 1956: 251) after being talked at by her boyfriend, it seems that she gives up and sac-rifices her wishes. However, scholars discuss whether the American or the girl can force their individual points in the end. The aim of this research paper is to examine this question.
