This means recognizing and building on students' cultural, linguistic, and community-based knowledge to make learning richer and more inclusive for everyone. Implementing an asset-based approach can transform our classrooms. Research shows that students perform better and feel more motivated when they're recognized and valued for who they are. Bringing students' lived experiences into the curriculum can help them develop positive identities and a stronger sense of belonging, which boosts their academic and social growth. Instead of focusing on fixing students, ABPs ask us to adapt our teaching to connect with students' cultural backgrounds and experiences, coupled with recognizing the wealth of knowledge that students bring from their families and communities. Switching to an asset-based approach helps us move away from simply encouraging perseverance or grit in students. Instead, it invites us to take responsibility for creating an environment where every student feels they belong and can succeed.
