He almost desperately wished to publish his early stories in *The New Yorker* magazine, the pinnacle, he felt, of America's literary world. But such was not to be for several long years and the length of one long world war. *The New Yorker*, whose tastes in literary matters were and remain notoriously prim and fickle, was not quite ready for this brash and over-confident newcomer with the cynical worldview and his habit of slangy dialogue. But other magazines were quick to recognize a new talent, a fresh voice at a time when the world verged on madness. *Story* magazine, an esteemed and influential small circulation journal devoted exclusively to the art of the short story and still active and respected today, was the first publication to publish the name J.D. Four years later toward the end of Salinger's war experience saw the publication of *Once A Week Won't Kill You*, again in *Story* magazine. Ostensibly about a newly minted soldier trying to tell an aging aunt he is going off to war, some may see the story as a
