THE CULTURAL CONTEXT OF WOODSTOCK FESTIVAL NUDITY

THE HIPPIE MOVEMENT AND BODY POSITIVITY

The hippie subculture celebrated the human body as a natural and beautiful entity, advocating for minimal clothing or no clothing at all in communal settings. This attitude was a rejection of the conservative, formal dress codes prevalent in mainstream society and symbolized a desire to reconnect with nature and authenticity. Woodstock festival nudity represented this ethos vividly, as many attendees chose to shed their clothes to express vulnerability, honesty, and unity with others.

SYMBOLISM OF NUDITY IN THE 1960s

REACTIONS TO NUDITY DURING THE FESTIVAL

MEDIA COVERAGE AND PUBLIC OPINION
